Marriages over 10 years are considered "long-term," potentially resulting in longer support periods. However, exceptions exist and are discussed and analyzed in the event is brought to a judge at time of trial.

Generally speaking, for marriages over 10 years, courts typically maintain jurisdiction to modify support based on changed circumstances, such as job loss or significant income changes.
